IRELAND RATIFIES UNITED NATIONS CONVENTION ON THE RIGHTS OF PERSONS WITH A DISABILITY

On March 7th 2018 Finian McGrath tabled a Motion in the Dail to Ratify the United Nations Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities (UNCRPD). This comes 11 years after Ireland first signed up to it.

Throughout 2017 Adult Services and Communications redoubled their efforts to campaign for the Ratification of the United Nations Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities (UNCRPD) including three high profile protests at Leinster House which gained National media coverage.

Our Service User Council recently met with Minister for Disabilities, Finian McGrath and raised questions with him about cultural changes needed to promote equal rights for people with disability, funding needed for transport, education, employment, accessibility, difficulties experienced in accessing community services and the issue of young people in nursing homes who would like the choice to live in the community.

Although Ireland has ratified a number of international human rights treaties, under Irish law, an individual can only engage the protections afforded under human rights law

that has been incorporated into national law. Ratification will not make disability rights legally binding, but it will mean that the Convention can be used in the courts to show the international standards that the state should be implementing.

The Government is now obliged to set up an independent committee, including persons with disabilities, to monitor whether they are complying with the rights set out in the Convention. The Government will also have to answer to a UN Committee if they are not implementing the Convention. and people whose rights are not being respected can complain personally to the UN Committee, which has been very forthright in condemning countries that are not respecting disability rights. But maybe most important is that ratification means the Government is acknowledging that people with a disability need and are entitled to rights and not just charity.

Throughout 2018 we will continue to campaign for implementation of this important Convention.

We will be in touch about how you can also get involved in maintaining the rights of individuals that we know and work with daily.

We were proud and humbled in February to launch a new booklet written by parents who attend a Parent & Toddler Group here in the CRC.

The Group was started in 2000 as most parents felt that when they attended parent & baby groups in their local area their children were singled out as 'special' and 'different' to other children. Given most of these children had a serious diagnosis this increased their feelings of loneliness and alienation. The stories are very powerful and detail the surge of high and low emotions that come with being a new parent to a child that is born with conditions ranging from mild Cerebral Palsy to ultra-rare conditions that only affect a few people in the world.

We are grateful to Nina and Jack Fitzpatrick and CRC Social worker Deirdre Keegan who appeared on TV3 show Ireland AM to highlight the work of the group and their personal stories. The stories offer hope and inspiration to other parents who may have received a diagnosis when pregnant, or are awaiting a diagnosis, and tell of a Group that have navigated their way through a health system that can save lives, but is also broken in places. We are indebted to all the parents that shared their stories in an effort to help others.

UPDATE ON SEVERAL CRC CAPITAL PROJECTS







1. CRC KILLESTER

It's always great to start with some good news, and what better than to tell you than the very exciting new hub in Killester has now been completed and handed over to CRC! This is a terrific new development for us and is the first time we have opened a new service in many years. We are currently furnishing the hub but the staff in Adult Services are throwing themselves enthusiastically into the task.

2. CRC SWIMMING POOL

The new equipment has been installed in the plant room for the main pool and the hydrotherapy pool, and we opened in February. This is great news for our school, our adults and the wider Dublin community who use the pool so often.

3. NEW GAS BOILERS IN CLONTARF

This project was probably one of the less obvious ones happening in Clontarf, but we have completed converting our old oil-burning boilers to brand new gas boilers. The gas boilers are installed and commissioned. This means going forward, CRC Clontarf will be greener and warmer. It also means that the folks in RTU won't have to worry about the recurrence of oil leaks, which resulted in them having to vacate their premises for most of 2016. So good news all round.

4. FLOOD AND DRAINAGE WORKS AT CLONTARF

As many of you are aware, the contractors have completed the first stage of their works, and have laid a temporary covering on the car park with temporary parking lines to facilitate users. The second phase at the rear of the site is due to be completed end of May. In the meantime, please keep with your current means of getting to work and thank you for your continued co-operation and patience. The CRC shuttle bus continues to work really well and there are plenty of spaces available in the Clontarf Rugby Club car park, while lots of hardy staff continue to cycle to work.

5. MASTERPLAN

The reception, dining area, boardroom, family room and activity room have now been completed.
