BABY PHYSIOTHERAPY COURSE



Our annual week long baby course "Physiotherapy for Babies and Infants with Cerebral Palsy and Developmental Delay" took place again in January with 17 physiotherapists from all over the country attending.

The group consisted mainly of physiotherapists that are working in the early intervention and school age network teams countrywide. The course is a combination of formal lectures and practical workshops covering analysis of typical, atypical development, Cerebral palsy aetiology, classification, assessment, therapy and goal setting. The practical workshops which last for two hours provide lots of opportunities for participants to handle and treat babies and children with a variety of developmental problems under the supervision of a CRC physiotherapist. This course is now recognised countrywide as an essential piece of training for physiotherapists working in early intervention and it is likely to increase in popularity as the reconfiguration of Progressing Disabilities Services gets underway. Aoife Quinn, Judith Maguire and Marie Joyce were lead tutors and

feedback as usual was excellent. There is already a waiting list for next year's course.

Although the course is led primarily by the three Clontarf physiotherapists, the support received from all CRC staff is vital to its success and we are hugely appreciative to all.

A special thanks to Gary and the canteen staff along with our paediatricians and the Gait lab.

Most of all we would like to thank the children and their families who volunteer to come in during the week for the practical sessions as this " hands on experience " for participants is extremely beneficial.

NATIONAL ADULT LITERACY AGENCY (NALA) AWARDS

ElectricAid is the social justice and development charity of ESB and EirGrid staff and pensioners, raising and spending about €1.2 million annually.

One of the partners ElectricAid has been involved with is a charity called MADIPA from Masaka in Uganda. This is a small self-help school and workshop, run, with minimal resources, by PWDs for PWDs where they provide education, support and possible employment opportunities. Two of the schools representatives- John Bosco Lukwago and Robert Muganga came to Ireland on behalf of Electric Aid from 24th to 27th Jan 2017 and visited the CRC.

Electric Aid wanted to try to give them an idea of what we do here in Ireland and what can be achieved with proper funding and ambition. They visited the CRC School and ATSS and learned about the therapy and educational services provided by CRC. They were fascinated by the sensory room, and the number of supportive chairs and boards on the school corridors. Robert told us how difficult it was to get even basic materials to make wheels for their wheelchairs. We look forward to helping them and sharing our knowledge with other Electric Aid charities in the future.

THE RIGHT TO DECIDE-A NEW CAMPAIGN & MOVEMENT

New laws about Assisted Decision Making have been introduced in Ireland – The Assisted Decision Making (Capacity) Act 2015. This Act has removed the system of placing someone under Guardianship, thereby removing their right to make their own decisions because they have a disability.

The new law respects that all people with disabilities can make their own decisions independently or with support. Support may be anything from having clear information to appointing a person to assist (through a decision making agreement). The CRC will run workshops on this new legislation in 2017 for adults attending CRC services and for families and carers. Please contact Rachel Glennane for more information.

CAFÉ NOEL RAISE €227.60 FOR MALAMULELE ONWARD CHARITY



CRC Occupational Therapist Tami Brown spent two years working for the charity Malamulele Onward in South Africa and they were the CRC 2016 Café Noel beneficiary.

Malamulele Onward was started by physiotherapist Gillian Saloojee nearly 11 years ago when she saw a need for intervention for children with cerebral palsy in rural areas of South Africa and Lesotho who at the time had no access to therapy services.

Gillian completed outreaches to the area from a more central hospital in a larger town about 200km away as there was no rehab team in the area. Hospitals are sparsely spread, so this means that people within the community may have to travel up to



three hours one way to get to these rural hospitals.

What started with a small team of Bobath/NDT trained therapists outreaching to Malamulele Hospital grew into an organisation running regular outreaches to 21 different sites throughout rural South Africa and Lesotho.

Rural hospitals are now better resourced due to the internship programmes set up for all graduates in South Africa, but in these hospitals children with CP typically receive 30 minutes of therapy monthly which translates to an average of four hours of therapy annually. The goal Malamulele Onward had was to make every second the child is seen in clinic really count and to empower parents and caregivers to manage basic interventions.



With donations like ours they can run training and education programames where parents and caregivers can learn more about conditions like cerebral palsy. Pictured is Khayakazi, aunt to Emihle, who spent two weeks with Malamulele Onward. The workshops provided Khayakazi with so much more than just knowledge. She remarked that not only had she had learnt a lot about CP during these workshops, but that the workshops also helped her to be more sociable and caring as well as giving her the opportunity to make new friends.

CRC ADULTS TAKE PART IN 2016 SOCIAL INCLUSION WEEK





As a part of 2016's Social Inclusion week Ballybough Community Centre ran a number of classes, two of which were chair aerobics and outdoor football.

CRC staff contacted Fergal Scally the Dublin City Council disability officer for North Dublin to inquire about the possibility of participating in a weekly chair aerobics class. This was ideal as it gave the Life Skills and Transition groups the opportunity to sample the class and decide if they wanted to continue.

There are a number of health and social benefits to taking part in chair aerobics. It helps strengthen your heart by elevating your heart rate, and improves endurance and muscle strength. There are fun activities involved like parachute football, line dancing and Zumba. The instructors, Barbara and Colm are extremely accommodating and helpful. They encourage each participant to carry out exercises to a level that everyone is comfortable with. It is a very inclusive and collaborative activity for both wheelchair and non-wheelchair users.

Joy Boland from the Life Skills programme has said "I like chair aerobics because it is good exercise and my favorite part is when we use the parachute".

Bronwen O'Reilly from the transition programme is a nonverbal wheelchair user who has limited access to activities in the community. Transition programme staff have felt Bronwen has benefited greatly from the class and from the social interaction, games and music.

Bernadette McGeady works with the Life Style group and has described the class and centre as "A lovely, friendly and welcoming atmosphere. The instructors Barbara and Colm who deliver the Wheelchair Aerobics' class are so enthusiastic, innovative and adaptable in their delivery of the class that it has become one of the highlights of the week for many adults and staff in Lifeskills. It is a fun, upbeat, healthy exercise class presented by flexible staff who love what they do, and who are highly attuned to the needs of the groups that they teach.

Conor Walsh from the Transition programme loves that he gets to play football with his friends and have a penalty shootout with the lads.

Damian Grennan on the Life Skills programme is one of the adults that participates in the soccer and travels independently to the centre, "I get the 40 bus from Finglas into town, then I get off at Burger King. Walk down to get the 29A in Abbey Street and that leaves me at the fire station in Fairview. I meet my friends there and we walk up together.

As it is so close to town the groups often get the bus into the city centre after class and go for lunch, visit museums, the cinema and other events that may be happening around the city.

The Transition group enjoy going to the Croke Park Café which is a short walk from Ballybough.

Leon Keogh from the Transition programme says the food is great in the Croke Park Café. "They do really good turkey sandwiches. The staff are lovely too and it's not too far from the community centre".

Fergal Scally, DCC disability officer believes it has been extremely rewarding to see the group engaging so well within the community and in particular with other groups that used the facility. "The weekly sessions are well received and positively beneficial for the service users. The group has become very familiar with both the facility and the staff and it is remarkable to see their confidence growing each week. Positivity beams from the entire group and needless to say they liven up the centre once they arrive!"

GAIT LAB RESEARCH WINS TWO AWARDS



The Gait Lab is conducting a study of 54 participants of all ages on 'The Progression of Crouch Gait in Bilateral Cerebral Palsy.

The Gait Lab will use data from these assessments to monitor how walking, daily activity and quality of life can change over time with growth and ageing. The hope is that they will identify what contributes to crouch increasing and advise on direct appropriate treatment.

So far, the Gait Lab has found a significant relationship between changes on the gait analysis graphs and activity levels and quality of life that were measured outside of the clinic. This suggests that the treatments and physiotherapy suggested after gait analysis can potentially improve overall function and activity in the community also.

Volunteers in the study were given ActivPal monitors which are tiny monitors that participants stick on to their leg. In the first year a total of 1,042,934 steps were recorded using the ActivPal monitors.

Using the average step length of those taking part in the study this is the equivalent of 705 kilometres which is the same distance as a return trip from Dublin to Galway!

The results to date have been presented at numerous conferences and were awarded two prizes by the Irish Society of Chartered Physiotherapists and Faculty of Sports and Exercise Medicine, RCSI.

CRC STAFF PARKING UPDATE

As you are aware following two significant instances of flooding at CRC in 2011 and 2013 our insurers have imposed an excess of €100,000 on our buildings policy. To avoid disruption of services to our clients, the CRC is beginning work on a flood defence system to offset the risk of future flooding.

To avoid further damage, disruption and costs, we are embarking on a major scheme of flood defence works to offset the risk of future flooding. These works require major drainage installations in the grounds/car park of CRC Clontarf and will have a severe impact on our ability to use and access our external spaces for a number of months. We intend to prioritise any remaining parking spaces on-site for our clients and their families while the work is ongoing.

Tenders are due back April 10th so this work will begin late May/June at the earliest. We have secured alternative staff parking at Clontarf Rugby Club for the duration of the works. However, there will be a small number of days when Rugby International games are held where there will be no availability. They will give us the dates in advance and we will communicate this to staff. Alternative arrangements will be made for this period. As you will appreciate, our first priority must be for the school children and service users who use our services and do not have access to other modes of transport. We will keep you updated on progress.

SURVEY RESULTS

The CRC sent out a travel survey to find out how many staff rely on a car and how many parking spaces were used during the working week. We had a great response and to date 193 people have responded with 71% of respondents using a car to get to and from work. Just over 53% of this group travel by car five days a week. Over 14% of staff already cycle to work with a further 18% stating that they intend to cycle to work once work has begun. About 20% of respondents are interested in more information on the Tax Saver schemes and HR has uploaded more information on these schemes to the intranet. We will now communicate our plans to the external groups that use the carpark and host a public information meeting for local residents. Our plans will be posted on the CRC website (www.crc.ie) and Facebook page.
